The Council held a virtual meeting on 19th November. Among items dealt with were:

Footpath No 4, near Hill Farm - site cleared.

Valley Farm - road flooding.

Corrective work has been scheduled.

Peter Aldous, MP. Zoom meetings.

Frank Burton reported that the meeting had been useful. He would be attending future meetings.

Village Christmas Tree.

Resolved to thank Bob Stephenson for supplying the village tree, as he had done for many years.

5, The Street. Planning issues were discussed.

<u>Chairmanship.</u> Hannah Pretty wished to stand down as Chairman. The Council resolved to ask her to reconsider.

Commemorative Bench.

Arrangements are to be made for its installation on the Village Field. Melita Rouse-Skeet is paying for the bench. The base will be financed by Tony Goldson's local budget.

Ash Tree Farm Planning Application.

No objection was made to an application to demolish outbuildings and erect a two-bedroomed annex.

Old Village Sign. The Village Hall Committee is to be asked to somehow accommodate the sign in the Hall. The Parish Precept. Consideration of this is to be deferred to the January meeting at the request of the East Suffolk District Council.

Churchyard Maintenance.

It was resolved to offer no further contribution to the Parochial Church Council for Churchyard maintenance. The PCC will be asked to consider other contractors and funding sources and to review the contract conditions.

The next Zoom meeting of the Parish Council will be on Thursday,21st January at 7.30 pm.

NEWS FROM ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH

:"At last a pattern of services is emerging...". Not for long, but we did have our candlelit All Souls Commemoration in traditional fashion, and we did have an outdoor Remembrance Sunday Service led by both Churchwardens, gathered round the porch decorated by Susan Fitch; Hugh Spink tolled the tenor bell and Tobin Lambert read the Names. The weather was fair, 26 people and one dog came, and it was good to see that the ceremony was much appreciated by some of the 'wider church community'. The church is still decorated with red and rosemary, and the haunting silhouettes of the Great War dead remain in the pews. After all the powder and shot, and an actual PCC on-line vote which favoured a modified Patronal Festival, we shall have to keep St. Andrew's Day 2020 in private after all, remembering how splendid it was last year, with a quarter peal, Jason playing, and Edward in great form, his last celebration with us.

Meanwhile, at present, our rulers are sparing December. We expect to be unable to sing carols in church, quite obviously, but at the time of the usual Carol Service, 6.30 p.m. on Sunday 19th, we plan to have a Service of Readings and Music. It will be necessary to book, through Maggie and me. If more would like to come than we can safely seat, we will put on the same service again at 6.30 the following day. This year it is our turn to have the Midnight Mass of the Nativity at 11.30 p.m on Christmas Eve, also booked through us please, but we cannot have the Crib Service. Our first service planned for 2021 is the Epiphany Service of Light at 6.30 p.m. on Wednesday 6th January.

AFTER THE LOCKDOWN... WE ARE IN TIER 2 WHAT ARE THE RULES...?

- 1. You can't socialise indoors with anyone you don't live with, or who is not in your support bubble.
- 2. You can meet in a group of 6 outside including in a garden or a public space.
- 3. Shops, gyms and personal cars, services (e.g. hair-dressing) can reopen, if Covid secure
- 4. Pubs and bars can only reopen if they serve substantial meals. Alcohol can be served with that meal.
- 5. Pubs and restaurants must shut at 23.00 GMT, with last orders at 22.00 GMT.
- 6. Sports can resume with up to 2000 spectators, or 50% capacity (whichever is smaller)
- 7. Collective worship, weddings and outdoor sports can resume (with restrictions)
- 8. Non-essential foreign travel allowed, subject to quarantine rules.
- 9. People are advised not to travel to and from tier 3 areas.

The tiers will be reviewed every 14 days, starting on the 16th December.
