SOLAR FACTORY IN GRAYS LANE

Communication with local residents

The developer (PACE) delayed submitting their planning application yet again, despite announcing that they would do so in August. In the meantime, they held a webinar* in August in order to update local residents about their plans. PACE claimed to show how they had taken on board concerns raised by local people. The webinar was only advertised on their own website and only one person logged in to listen on the day! PACE announced that they intend to plant more hedging than was originally planned and will move some solar panels a little further away from a couple of houses on the site. They did not address <u>any</u> of the objections or questions raised at the three public meetings.

Traffic Chaos in Wissett Street

PACE have recently stated on their website that <u>all</u> the traffic for the proposed building site will be directed from the Norwich Road through Wissett Street and up Grays Lane in both directions. The estimated build time for this development is over 30 weeks and will involve more than a thousand vehicle journeys through the centre of the village to deliver solar panels, container sized battery storage units, heavy plant, fencing and thousands of tonnes of crushed stone for vehicle tracks as well as workers to and from the site.

This route is wholly unacceptable and when the planning application is evenyually submitted it will be crucial to write and object to this ludicrous proposal.

The Save Grays Lane Steering Group is poised to offer guidance to those wishing to complain when the time comes. The Group will also commission expert witnesses to help us raise objections. We can achieve this because many people have generously donated money through our crowdfunding campaign. We now have just over £9,000 so there is not much further to go to reach our target of £10,000 - thank you to all those who have donated funds. On 21st September we were honoured with the packed funeral of Peter Cutts who spent his whole life in Wissett, which is recalled in this number of the Wissett Web.

We are moving towards the season of Remembrance. November 2nd is All Souls Day. The church will be open and candlelit from 5 pm to 7 pm for quiet commemoration of all those we have known and loved. The traditional service of Remembrance will be at 10.45 am on Sunday, 13th November.

PETER CUTTS

Peter Cutts was a man of the village. He was born at Stone Cottage, which is close to the village school along the road to Rumburgh, to parents Edward and Alice. His father, known locally as Poodle, worked at the Halesworth Maltings. The couple had ten children of which Peter was the youngest. He said that he enjoyed his first day at school but when there was a break he thought it was the end of the day so he went home. He had to be taken back to school for the rest of the day's lessons. His family moved to 1 Brickhill Cottages in 1933. When Peter left school, and indeed for the rest of his working life he was employed in the Wissett orchards, firstly for Don Meen at Manor farm, then for Mr Richardson at The Pines and again at Manor Farm this time for Martin Kempe. In 1950 he married Glenna Lovett, and they brought up their two children, Linda and Malcolm at number six Brickhill Cottages. Sadly, Glenna died in 1993. Peter was an active member of the village in his younger days, playing in the Wissett Robins football team and as one of the founding members of the Bowls Club. At his funeral and after at the Plough there were many memories of Peter. Derek remembered when he moved to his small holding and expanded into fruit Peter would freely offer advice on pruning. Peter walked up to Derek's farm several times a week. They would have tea and biscuits in the tunnel and discuss everything about Wissett past and present, Ipswich town Football, Wissett Robins and playing against Ted Philips before Ted went to Ipswich. Until recently he was often at the Plough where he would sample the ales and would often finish off with a "Ding-a-ling" which was a tot of Bell's whisky and a drop of bitter. Peter enjoyed this but it was not to everybody's taste!

If you wanted to find one of nature's true gentlemen it would be Peter. No one had a bad word to say about him and he never had a bad word to say about anyone else. He had an encyclopaedic knowledge about the village and was happy to share it from talking about old residents of the village to giving advice to the water board when they could not find their underground pipes. But what people remember about Peter is quick and sharp wit and his smile.

Many people have their own memories of Peter one such is from Alison:

"We moved to St Michael South Elmham in 2007. My Grandmother was born in Wissett. She would often recall memories of the village and tell us that on the day she was born in 1901 her father Bob Bird was playing marbles in the street outside the pub. My husband Colin and I decided to check out Wissett and indeed the pub. We arrived at the Plough at about noon and asked the landlord, then Nick, questions about the village. He told us that about quarter past twelve a man called Peter would be in and if we bought him a drink he would answer all our queries. Sure enough, at the allotted time, he appeared, a pint of his favourite tipple, Adnams, was purchased and so our friendship with Peter began. It turned out he went to school with my uncle, and he remembered my Grandmother and my mother. After that enjoyable lunch we spend many hours over the years enjoying his company. He was a true gentleman and our family will all miss him."

We all have examples of his stories, wit and jokes.


